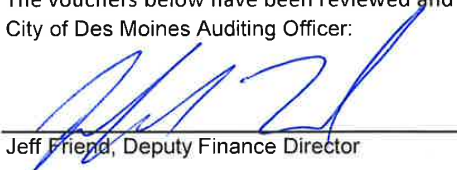

Purpose and Recommendation

The purpose of this agenda item is for City Council to consider the proposed Resolution designating Juneteenth as a holiday for the City of Des Moines to be observed on June 19 of each year. This designation encourages City employees to cherish freedom and acknowledge the history of slavery in this country. Approval of the motion below will also authorize the City Manager to amend the Personnel Manual for non-represented employees and proposes a Memorandum of Agreement for employees covered under the Teamsters Local 763 collective bargaining agreement in order to implement the holiday.

Suggested Motion

Motion 1: "I move to adopt Draft Resolution No. 21-027 designating Juneteenth as a City of Des Moines holiday for non-represented employees and employees covered under the Teamsters Local 763 collective bargaining agreement, beginning in 2021 and authorize the City Manager to sign the Memorandum of Understanding substantially in the form as attached."

Background

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, which freed enslaved people of African descent. Though President Lincoln's proclamation emancipated enslaved people, slave owners were given the responsibility for telling their slaves that they were "free." Many slave-owners chose to ignore the order and to withhold the news from their slaves regarding their emancipation.

Almost two and a half years later, on June 19, 1865, Union soldiers, led by General Gordon Granger arrived at Galveston, Texas with the news that the war had ended and to enforce the freedom of an estimated 250,000 enslaved African Americans in Texas. This day later became known as "Juneteenth", the melding of the words June and nineteenth. Juneteenth marks a day of celebration of freedom and the Emancipation Proclamation.

In its 2021 term, the Washington State legislature passed Substitute House Bill 1016, which makes the nineteenth day of June a state legal holiday beginning in 2022 as a day of remembrance for the day when slaves learned of their freedom.

Discussion

The City of Des Moines Municipal Code (DMMC) section 1.02.140 makes any state legal holiday a legal holiday of the City. Though the Substitute House Bill 101 does not officially recognize Juneteenth as a legal holiday until June 2022, it is proposed that the City should not delay the dedication of the nineteenth of June as an official holiday for one more year. Due to the significance of this day in American history and in recognition of our efforts to continue improving our policies and practices to enhance a culture of inclusion at the City, it is important the City adopt Juneteenth as a City holiday in 2021.

The celebration of Juneteenth is an opportunity for us to reflect on why freedom was deprived from some in the first place, remembrance of the liberation of approximately four million African-Americans and plan for a brighter future as our society continues to attempt to address racial and social injustices.

Alternatives

The Council could choose not to approve the Resolution and direct the City Manager to adopt Juneteenth as a paid holiday in 2022.

Financial Impact

If approved, City Hall would be closed in recognition of this holiday and City employees, (specifically non-represented employees and employees covered under the Teamsters Local 763 collective bargaining agreement) would receive a paid holiday. Finance has determined the addition of the paid Juneteenth holiday in 2021 for non-represented employees and employees covered under the Teamsters Local 763 collective bargaining agreement, and any associated increase to costs is sustainable and can be maintained with passage of this Draft Resolution within the current 2021 budget.

Recommendation or Conclusion

Administration recommends approval.

CITY ATTORNEY'S FIRST DRAFT 5/28/2021

DRAFT RESOLUTION NO. 21-027

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DES MOINES, WASHINGTON, declaring the nineteenth of June an official holiday to be known as Juneteenth and authorizing the City Manager to amend the City employee manual.

WHEREAS, on January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, setting in motion the end of slavery in the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Civil War ended with the surrender of General Lee at Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865, and

WHEREAS, this news reached Texas when Union General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston Bay with Union troops. It was on June 19, 1865, that he announced: "The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free", and

WHEREAS, celebration of the end of slavery, which became known as Juneteenth, is the oldest known public celebration of the end of slavery in the United States, and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth commemorates African American freedom and celebrates the successes gained through education and greater opportunity, and

WHEREAS, on a larger scale, celebration of Juneteenth reminds each of us of the precious promises of freedom, equality, and opportunity which are at the core of the American Dream, and

WHEREAS, in its 2021 term, the Washington State Legislature passed Substitute House Bill 1016 which makes the nineteenth day of June a state legal holiday, recognized as Juneteenth, a day of remembrance for the day the slaves learned of their freedom, and

WHEREAS, Substitute House Bill 1016 was signed into law by Governor Jay Inslee on May 13, 2021, to take effect on July 25, 2021, and

WHEREAS, section 1.02.140 of the Des Moines Municipal Code (DMMC) makes any state legal holiday a legal holiday of the City of Des Moines, and

WHEREAS, the recognition of Juneteenth as a legal holiday by operation of DMMC 1.02.140 will not become effective until June 19, 2021 has already passed, and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Des Moines finds that the important principles underlying the Juneteenth holiday demand that the City not delay the dedication of the nineteenth of June as an official holiday for one more year, and

WHEREAS, in order to implement the City's recognition of the Juneteenth holiday as a day of remembrance for the day the slaves learned of their freedom, the City personnel manual will need to be timely updated to reflect the new official holiday, and

WHEREAS, City's collective bargaining agreement with the International Brotherhood of Teamsters Local 763 requires a Memorandum of Agreement with the Local Union to implement the City's recognition of the Juneteenth among those employees covered by that agreement; now therefore,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DES MOINES RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 1. The City Council of the City of Des Moines finds that on June 19, 1865, two and one-half years after President Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation and two months after the end of the Civil War, news finally reached Galveston, Texas, that the Civil War had ended and that all enslaved persons were now released from the bondage of slavery. Slavery has left a catastrophic and unrelenting legacy of trauma for generations of Black/African Americans. Racism, discrimination, and inequity have been prevalent throughout the United States of America since 1619, which has cost Black/African Americans life, liberty, and prosperity.

Sec. 2. The City Council also finds that June 19th has been celebrated in smaller communities across the nation as Juneteenth. Also known as Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, Liberation Day, and Emancipation Day, Juneteenth is a holiday that celebrates the emancipation of those who had been enslaved in the United States. Although this day has special significance for Black/African Americans in the state of Washington, the historical and continued harms of slavery and the rejoicing of the end of

this atrocity should be acknowledged and celebrated by all Washingtonians.

Sec. 3. Consistent with actions taken by the Washington State Legislature, the City intends to designate Juneteenth as a legal holiday to celebrate the end of chattel slavery. The City encourages that this be a day to engage in fellowship with Black/African Americans; revisit our solidarity and commitment to antiracism; educate ourselves about slave history; and continue having conversations that uplift every resident of Des Moines.

Sec. 4. The City of Des Moines declares the nineteenth day of June, 2021 as a legal holiday, to be known as "Juneteenth", a day of remembrance for the day the slaves learned of their freedom.

Sec. 5. The City Manager is authorized to amend the City Employee Manual to add the nineteenth day of June to the list of observed holidays.

Sec. 6. The City Manager is directed to propose the Memorandum of Agreement to the International Brotherhood of Teamsters Local 763 substantially in the form attached and to sign the Memorandum substantially in the form attached upon acceptance and execution by the Local.

Sec. 7. Conflicts. Where a conflict exists between the terms of this Resolution and the Des Moines Personnel Manual, this Resolution shall control.

Sec. 8. Ratification and confirmation. Any acts consistent with the authority and prior to the effective date of this Resolution are hereby ratified and confirmed.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT
by and between
CITY OF DES MOINES
and
INTERNATIONAL BROTHERHOOD OF TEAMSTERS,
LOCAL UNION 763
REPRESENTING THE PUBLIC WORKS, PARKS AND MARINA EMPLOYEES

This Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), made effective as of the date of signing, is entered into by and between the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Local 763 (Union), representing Public Works, Parks and Marina employees and the City of Des Moines (Employer), referred to herein collectively as the Parties.

On June 3, 2021, the City of Des Moines City Council adopted a Proclamation (attached and incorporated herein) and Draft Resolution 27-021 amending the City Personnel Manual to add an eleventh paid holiday commemorating Juneteenth (on June 19) for non-represented employees; and

The Employer and the Union are parties to a Collective Bargaining Agreement that expires on December 31, 2022; and

On June 4, 2021 May 2, 2021 (what date here?), the Employer proposed to the Union that the Parties agree to include Juneteenth as a recognized holiday.

On _____, the Union agreed to include Juneteenth as a recognized holiday.

THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

Effective upon ratification and execution between the parties, the Employer and the Union agree to amend Article VIII, Vacation and Holiday, of the Collective Bargaining Agreement by adding an additional Employer holiday and thereby increasing the number of recognized holidays to eleven (11) holidays for Public Works, Parks and Marina employees in recognition of the Juneteenth holiday.

Juneteenth The Employer retains the exclusive discretion to designate the date of observance each year. [MH1]

This Memorandum of Agreement is effective upon signing and shall expire when incorporated into a successor Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Parties.

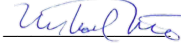

Purpose and Recommendation:

The purpose of this agenda item is to recognize June 19, 2021 as Juneteenth.

Suggested Motion

MOTION: "I move to approve the proclamation acknowledging June 19, 2021 as a significant date in American history that essentially was one of the last actions of the civil war and confirmed the abolition of slavery."

Background:

June 19, 1865 marks the date that Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas and announced the end of both the Civil War and Slavery. The 1865 date is largely symbolic in that the Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Abraham Lincoln, had legally freed slaves on January 1, 1863, almost 2 ½ years earlier. Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States and is considered the longest running African American holiday. In its 2021 term, the Washington State Legislature passed Substitute House Bill 1016, which makes the nineteenth of June a state legal holiday beginning in 2022 as a day of remembrance for the day when slaves learned of their freedom.

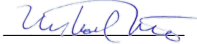

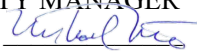
